OPEN

OPEN is an ongoing project held with and for people who were forced to leave Ukraine. Since April 2022, the art educator Lyudmila Harvey is leading workshops for kids, teenagers and adults at the Kunsthaus Zug. The participants experience the exhibitions through collective reflection and discussion of the artworks. A very important aspect of the project is the creation of a safe space for the participants during their stay at the Kunsthaus Zug. They are encouraged to share their thoughts and emotions on the artworks and are accompanied by Lyudmila Harvey throughout the process.

After the collective discussion of the exhibitions, the participants are invited to create their own works in the art education atelier of Kunsthaus Zug. Throughout the month of August up to December 2022, paintings and collages were made that were shown on the occasion of a project presentation on the 10th of December 2022 at Kunsthaus Zug.

A flyer was printed and the participants invited their friends, family and community to the project presentation - also, the Kunsthaus Zug invited their members via a newsletter. The flyer was shared on social media and the homepage of Kunsthaus Zug.

The kids and teenagers involved in the workshops collectively developed a curatorial and art educational concept for their exhibition. They participated in the hanging and arranging of the works and were proud to show them to the public. The art educational interventions consisted of questions directed towards the visitors that ment to fuel the discussion of the works. The questions asked were, for example:

Which emotions does this work bring out in you?

What strikes you the most in this piece?


What memories does this piece revive?

What does this mean to you?

What sounds/smells could you imagine inside this painting?


Furthermore, the kids developed "fragment cards" which displayed parts of works that could be searched for in the exhibition. All art educational interventions were available in four languages: German, English, Russian and Ukrainian.

After small opening speeches by Chantal Küng and Lyudmila Harvey, the kids were also handed small gifts to encourage them to follow up on their creative practices; acrylic paint, paintbrushes and canvases.




